THEME OF THE MONTH: Black friday | Black friday

Black Friday is one of the biggest shopping days of the year. On the last Friday of November, stores offer major discounts both online and in physical shops. Many Danes use the day to buy Christmas gifts at lower prices. The day is now a regular part of Danish shopping culture, often with deals lasting the entire week.

PHENOMENON:

J-Day | J-dag

On J-Day, Danes gather at bars and cafés to celebrate the release of the Christmas beer. Friends meet after work or studies, and at 20:59, Tuborg staff hand out free Christmas beer "julebrygg". The night is filled with music, snow cannons, and blue Santa hats, with venues and bars hosting live bands, DJs, and special offers. It's a festive evening of beer, fun, and early Christmas spirit.

SEASONAL HIGHLIGHT:

St. Martin's Eve | Mortens aften

St. Martin's Eve, or Mortens Aften, is a Danish tradition celebrated on 11 November. Families gather to enjoy roast duck with caramelised potatoes and red cabbage. According to legend, Bishop Saint Martin hid to avoid being appointed, but noisy geese revealed him—so Danes eat duck instead of goose. It's a cosy evening where many enjoy a festive meal.

THEME OF THE MONTH: Christmas | Jul

Christmas Eve is the highlight of Danish Christmas celebrations. Families enjoy a festive dinner with dishes like roast duck and pork, followed by dancing around the Christmas tree and singing carols. Children open their presents, and the evening ends with risalamande, a rice pudding where the person who finds the hidden almond wins a prize.

PHENOMENON:

Christmas Procession | Juleoptog

Christmas processions are a beloved tradition. Children dressed in festive costumes sing carols and carry candles or lanterns. These processions accompanied by Christmas music offer a special opportunity for communities to gather all ages, celebrate the holiday season, and spread Christmas cheer.

SEASONAL HIGHLIGHT:

Christmas Lunch | Julefrokost

"Julefrokost" gatherings are held throughout December. It's a festive meal featuring classic dishes like pickled herring, liver pate, meatballs, and roast pork. The lunch is often accompanied by snaps (a type of schnapps) and traditional Danish songs. It's a time for family, friends, and colleagues to gather, enjoy good food, and celebrate the season.

LOCALISE AND ADAPT TO THE NEW MARKET

Europe is home to more than 740 million people of which an estimated 550 million are regularly shopping online. There are obvious similarities between markets and

obvious similarities between markets and populations, but there are also important differences that should not be overlooked.

As mentioned above, it is crucial to be familiar with the needs and expectations of your new customers regarding for instance delivery, payments and return policy. Even if your neighbouring countries are culturally and geographically similar, there are always differences that are important to consider in order to build a successful conversion rate.

That being said, It is always easier to

That being said, it is always easier to enter a market that is similar to your home market. For example, more parallels can be drawn between Germany and Austria, than between Sweden and France.

If you are able to build trust and greet international customers visiting your webshop in a professional manner, your chances of generating sales increase significantly. To do that, there are several crucial factors to consider.



Payment methods

There are considerable differences between the ways in which customers from different European countries prefer to pay for their products and a great number of online shoppers will abandon number of online snoppers will abandon their order, and take their business elsewhere if a certain method of payment isn't available at check-out. Therefore, you should think carefully before you choose which payment

methods to offer. A good idea is to consult experienced providers of payment solutions in your home market to get insight and advice on the subject.

Delivery services

deliveries. Every time you launch in a new market, remember to consider which couriers your new customers are expecting to be able to choose from in

expecting to be able to choose from in your webshop.

All customers prefer a seamless shopping experience. This includes the delivery of their purchased product. A change of courier mid-transit, not being able to

courier mid-transit, not being able to track the order or other complications of the shipping process, can result in a negative experience for your customers. If you are planning to launch internationally, but currently only have a small volume of sales outside of your local market, then you probably won't have a lot of leverage to negotiate with, as you look for a local courier partner.
